### **MISSION STATEMENT**

## **THE DEPARTMENT**

The UMKC Police Department is charged with protection of University and private property, and the safety of all persons in the buildings and on the grounds of the University of Missouri-Kansas City.

It is the mission of the department to maintain an environment that is conducive to pursuit of academic endeavors. As with any other law enforcement agency, it is the duty of the University Police officer to keep the peace and maintain order.

The University of Missouri-Kansas City Police Department is organized as any other police agency. The University Police Department is comprised of 28 sworn officers and a civilian support staff consisting of radio dispatchers, clerical staff and security guards. The UMKC Police Department has primary law enforcement jurisdiction on the campus and associated University properties. The department is empowered as a full-service state law enforcement agency pursuant to Chapter and Section 172.350 and 172.355 of the Missouri Revised State Statutes, and fully subscribes to the standards of the Missouri Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST).

Chief of Police Scott Shelton heads the department. The department handles all patrol, investigation, crime prevention education, emergency preparedness and related law enforcement duties for the campus community and operates 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The patrol division handles the calls for service, traffic enforcement, and accident investigation. A detective division investigates criminal cases that occur on University property. A crime prevention unit provides safety and crime information for the university community. The communications center receives incoming phone calls, radio traffic, and makes electronic inquiries about wanted persons, license plates and individuals. The department enforces the University parking rules and regulations as well as city traffic regulations on adjacent and surrounding streets.

UMKC Police Officers are graduates of the Kansas City Police Academy or the Western Missouri Police Academy where they receive more than 900 hours of law enforcement training.

The academy training consists of approximately seven months of instruction covering Constitutional Law, Missouri Statutory Law, Traffic Law, Criminal Investigation, First Aid, Human Behavior, Juvenile Justice and Procedures, Patrol, Report Writing, Traffic Investigation, Defensive Tactics, Driver Training, Firearms, and Physical Training. Successful completion of the academy is a prerequisite for continued employment. All officers are certified through the Missouri Department of Public Safety and have the full authority of any other police officer. During the year, in-service training and updating take place.

The UMKC Police Department enjoys an excellent working and cooperative relationship with local, state and federal law enforcement agencies. The department is a member of the following professional organizations:

# **Crime/Incident Reporting**

## **Crimes**

A university campus is not immune to crime. The University of Missouri-Kansas City subscribes to the ideal that an informed and educated population (faculty, staff, students and visitors) are less likely to become victims of crime. To this end, this institution makes public the nature and quantity of reported crimes occurring on University grounds and in University buildings.

## **Policy on Crime Reporting**

The University of Missouri-Kansas City Police Department is the primary agency for reporting and investigating all crimes that occur on University property and as such, it shall be the policy of the University of Missouri-Kansas City Police Department to encourage prompt reporting of those crimes; prompt reporting of all incidents that could result in injury to or death of persons; damage to, destruction, theft or disappearance of University property (including money and securities) or property of others. These incidents are reported in order that causes may be determined and corrective measures taken to improve life safety and preserve University assets. The University Police Department is staffed 24 hours a day.

The University does not have a voluntary confidential reporting system for annual crime statistics. There are some very good reasons, in addition to prosecuting criminal activity, to promptly report crime.

- Timely notification about certain types of crime may affect the safety of others. These crimes include murder, rape, sexual assault, burglary, robbery, motor vehicle theft and arson.
- When you make your report, you assist UMKC Police in maintaining accurate records of the incidence of crime on campus. This information helps to keep the campus safe by providing the most accurate information on criminal activity to members of the campus community.

## **Reporting Crimes**

All crime victims are encouraged to report every incident to the University Police regardless of how seemingly insignificant the crime.

To report a crime, the victim or witness need only call 235-1515 or use any emergency phone on campus. A police officer will meet with the victim or witness to gather information and prepare an official report. Each day incidents from the previous day are made available to key staff, other law enforcement agencies, and the prosecuting attorney, if necessary.

In addition to the yearly statistics provided in this booklet and on our web site, our department will make periodic reports, or Crime Alerts, to the campus community of recent crimes that may affect the quality of life in the campus area. These reports are intended to raise awareness regarding criminal activity so that the community can increase or implement personal safety strategies. The University does not have a voluntary confidential reporting system for annual crime statistics.

The University of Missouri-Kansas City Police Department has been keeping crime statistics since 1963.

# **Sex Offenses on Campus**

## **Campus Sexual Assault Policy Statement**

UMKC strongly denounces sexual assault in any form and advocates the immediate reporting of any incident to campus authorities.

UMKC stands ready to offer assistance within its resources to victims of sexual assault. Confidentiality will be maintained to the extent provided by rules, regulations and legislation.

Individuals, groups and organizations that desire information or programs that address sexual assaults and how to prevent such incidents should contact the UMKC Police.

Victims of sex-related crimes on campus should contact the UMKC Police.

Victims of sex-related crimes off-campus should contact the local police department. The UMKC Police will gladly assist the individual in contacting the proper agency.

In all cases, the protection of any physical evidence is of utmost importance.

The Counseling Center will assist victims. The Counseling Center will also help find counseling and mental health agencies in the metropolitan area for victims.

All campus disciplinary procedures are the responsibility of the Office of Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs. Students should call (816) 235-1141.

The University may, upon final determination and confirmation of an alleged infraction (forcible or non-forcible), impose sanctions ranging from counseling to expulsion.

## **Procedures Regarding Rape and Sexual Assault**

A UMKC student who is the victim of a sexual assault should do the following immediately after the assault:

- A. Call the University Police Department, 911 or 235-1515. If the sexual assault occurred off campus, the victim may still call UMKC Police. If the victim chooses, UMKC Police will notify the appropriate agency to handle the report.
  
- B. Seek medical attention in an emergency room that performs legal rape exams. Locally that would be St. Luke's Hospital, 4401 Wornall Road, 816-932-2000.

If you choose to call the University Police as one of your options, and if you choose to file a report of the incident, the following information will be discussed with you.

- A. Remember that YOU are a victim. You have nothing to feel guilty or ashamed about.
- B. As soon as you call, a police officer will contact you at the scene of the attack, the hospital, or another location.
- C. To preserve evidence, you should not bathe or change clothes or do any cleaning up in any manner prior to receiving medical assistance.
- D. You are the person in control when you contact the police department and you decide how you want the incident handled.
  1. You may press charges against the suspect.
  2. You may ask that University disciplinary action be initiated against the suspect.
  3. You may ask the police to contact the suspect about the incident, and still choose not to have the suspect arrested.
  4. You may tell the police not to contact the suspect about the incident, and still choose not to have the suspect arrested.

It is not required that you press charges against the suspect, but the police hope that you will proceed with prosecution. Then, your assailant may be arrested for what they have done to you. However, IT IS YOUR CHOICE.

You may also choose to proceed through the University Discipline Procedure in addition to, or in lieu of, pressing criminal charges against the suspect. The University Discipline Procedure provides that in cases of alleged sexual assault:

- A. The accused is subject to University sanctions which may include probation, suspension from the University for a specified time, or permanent expulsion from the University.
  
- B. The accuser and the accused are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during a campus disciplinary proceeding.
  
- C. The accuser and the accused shall be informed of the outcome of any campus disciplinary proceeding which alleges a sexual assault.

The UMKC Office of Student Affairs will assist student victims of sex-related crimes with changes in academic schedules and living arrangements, as is reasonable and within the University's control.

## **Alcohol Policy**

The use or possession of any alcoholic beverage is strictly prohibited on all University property except where appropriate University approval is given, subject to legal requirements. Guidelines for alcohol use are available at the Student Life Office, located on the ground floor of the University Center. To request the use of alcoholic beverages, individuals should inquire at the Office of Student Auxiliary Services.

## **Drug Policy**

The University of Missouri regulations prohibit the manufacture, use, possession, sale or distribution of alcoholic beverages or any controlled substance without proper prescription or required license or as expressly permitted by law or University regulations, including operating a vehicle on University property, or on streets or roadways adjacent to and abutting a campus, under the influence of alcohol or a controlled substance as prohibited by law of the state of Missouri. ## **Alcohol or Substance Abuse Assistance**

Such referrals will be confidential.

## **Crime Prevention**

The University Police Department makes every effort to be proactive to reduce and prevent crime. Some efforts are:

The Student Government Association offers an escort service through "SAFEWALK." This service is available Monday through Thursday evenings until 11 p.m. For an escort on campus call 235-5400.

### **Your Role in Preventing Crime**

A high percentage of campus crimes are incidents of opportunity. Often, faculty, staff and students contribute to crimes of opportunity by needlessly placing themselves or their property at risk. You need to know that crime has no boundaries and can occur anywhere. Prevention efforts can be effective in reducing the opportunities for criminal activity. You play a key role in crime prevention efforts. Be cautious, careful, and alert to your own safety and protective of your possessions and University property.

In addition to preventing crime, considerable effort is devoted to crime intervention.

### **Prevention Tips**

- Do not hesitate to call police when confronted.
- Keep your residence room locked.
- At night, walk in groups of at least two and stay on main walkways.
- Familiarize yourself with the location of emergency phones.
- When parking, remove valuables from view and lock your vehicle.
- Engrave your valuables with your driver's license number and record serial numbers.
- Make copies of credit cards and other valuables in your wallet.
- Report all losses to University Police immediately.
- Stay in control. Do not allow the abuse of alcohol or other substances to put you at risk.
- Do not leave personal property unattended.
- Be aware of your surroundings and what is going on around you.
- Do not hesitate to report suspicious individuals or activity to the University Police.

Please remember security is everyone's business.

### **Crime Prevention Training**

In 2001, some of the crime prevention programs and workshops presented by the University Police included:

- New student orientations
- Parent orientation programs
- Transfer student orientations
- New faculty orientation
- Special workshops on personal safety for UMKC's Human Resources Office
- Fraternity and sorority programs
- SAFEWALK volunteer briefings
- Men and women residence hall members (given every year in the first two weeks of school)
- Alcohol abuse programs
- Student activities' fairs
- Dormitory Resident Assistant's Workshop

The UMKC Police presented more than two dozen crime prevention and personal safety workshops and seminars (some of these were done in conjunction with the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department). UMKC Police will do presentations at any time upon request or on a regularly scheduled basis.

## **Policy for Campus Facility Access**

It is the policy of the University of Missouri-Kansas City that other than normal working hours, all buildings shall be locked to maintain the security of the buildings and their contents.

Staff members and students may be issued keys to University buildings upon recommendation of the department chair or administrative head, in accordance with established procedures.

Keys are issued for entry to University buildings for the purpose of conducting University business only.

All faculty, staff or students who are not issued a key may gain access to a specific area of a specific building in accordance with the following procedure:

1. Written and signed permission from the dean, director, or departmental head of the specified location. This written and signed authorization shall be filed with the University Police at least 24 hours in advance. Anyone not on the authorization list and in the specified location will be asked to leave.
2. An authorized individual entering or leaving a locked building shall not permit any individual to enter who would not normally be permitted to enter the building during the hours it is locked. Authorized individuals may have guests with them as long as the guests stay in the proximity of faculty or staff members having the assigned key and the authorized individual assumes full responsibility for their presence.
3. An individual entering or leaving a locked building shall be responsible for securing the door and may be held responsible for any damage to University property resulting from non-secured doors.

The loss or theft of any key is to be reported immediately to the department chair or administrative head who, in turn, will notify Campus Facilities Management and Campus Police.

All faculty, staff and students are to have their University identification with them while on campus. Also they should produce the identification upon request from the University Police.

Situations that individuals perceive as security hazards are requested to report same to the University Police or Campus Facilities Management.

Residence Hall students should never prop locked doors open or loan their residence hall keys to anyone. Students are to make themselves familiar with Residence Hall policies concerning visitors, after hours admittance and general security policies. These policies and rules can be obtained from their resident assistant, resident manager or the Housing Office.

## Information Updates

While the University Police work closely with other jurisdictions, it is difficult to track information in a large, two-state metropolitan area. Your cooperation and assistance is necessary.

It should also be noted that every attempt is made to track criminal statistics at off-campus locations. Specifically, these are locations that are not University owned (and not under University Police Jurisdiction) such as, fraternity/sorority houses, conference centers, etc.

Heads of these facilities are strongly encouraged to report crimes to the local law enforcement agency immediately. They also are encouraged to supply information to the University Police.

All faculty, staff and students interested in reported offenses are encouraged to weekly read the University News, UMKC's student newspaper. The newspaper prints the past week's reported crimes and their locations. Also UMKC's bimonthly publication, *UMKC Inside*, prints the current on-campus crime statistics.

Individuals interested in "crime alerts," current year on-campus crime statistics, and how to obtain crime prevention programs and materials, should call (816) 235-6000. This "Campus Crime Information Line" offers a recorded message containing information.

Individuals wishing to report activity anonymously or who wish to provide information concerning a specific crime are encouraged to call (816) 235-2677.

Reporting of secondhand, hearsay, and rumors are strongly encouraged to determine validity, avoid duplication of numbers, and to ascertain so far as possible what actually happened; and, to make that information available to the campus community.

In cases where the information about a crime occurring can be reasonably substantiated, yet a victim cannot be located or does not wish to file a report, will be so indicated.

Crimes that are reported to the Kansas City, Missouri, Police Department yet are on clearly defined UMKC property are referred to the UMKC Police Department. Efforts are made to avoid duplication of reports. However, in the residential subset reports are taken by Kansas City Police Department that may be unknown by the UMKC Police or may include duplication of incidents. This is especially true of the property called Twin Oaks and the area designated "University Village" (53rd Street to 54th Street / Rockhill Road to Troost Avenue). These will be included in Campus Totals. .

Truman Campus does not appear for 1999 & on because UMKC had no functions at that location.

## UMKC On-Campus Residential Facilities
